Main Feature: Britten Day 2025

On 24 November, the School held its annual Britten Day commemorations to mark the 112th birthday of its namesake. A special assembly was held in the Theatre for Year 7 scholars highlighting Britten's childhood in Lowestoft, during which staff provided an insight into Britten's life and achievements. Afterwards, a small group of specially selected Year 7 and Year 9 scholars accompanied Mr Mullender (careers) on the annual Britten Tour, which began at Britten's family home on Kirkley Cliff Road and paid a visit to the newly-installed 'Britten as a Boy' statue in Kitchener's Gardens on the seafront. The group then visited Snape Maltings for lunch before concluding the day by the laying of flowers on Britten's grave in Aldeburgh churchyard, continuing a school tradition dating back to 1978. Scholars who accompanied the tour were K. Hudson, A. Walton, B. Van Kroonenburg, K. Clements, E. Smith, J. Hipperson, C. Hipperson, K. Gott and C. Cole.







Flowers were laid on the grave of Benjamin Britten by B. Van Kroonenburg and K. Gott, continuing a tradition of nearly fifty years standing. Scholars also visited The Scallop on Aldeburgh Beach, designed by the sculptor Maggi Hambling which was unveiled in 2003.

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Phone Policy

Red House & Aldeburgh Visit: For the week commencing 17 November, all Year 7 form groups and their tutors were able to visit the Red House in Aldeburgh, Benjamin Britten's home from 1957 to his death in 1976. Scholars were given guided tours of the house by members of Britten Pears Arts and were shown a wide array of Britten's personal possessions, including items from the Britten-Pears Archive relating to his childhood in Lowestoft. They were even able to see the room where the late Queen Elizabeth II once sat and had lunch with him. The group then visited Aldeburgh for a walking tour of sites important to Britten's life there, including the Jubilee Hall, Moot Hall and his first house in the town. The day was concluded by chips on the seafront. Category 1 Academy Football Trip:

On 26 November, fifteen members of the Year 7 boys' football team enjoyed an unforgettable day at Norwich City Football Club's prestigious Category 1 Academy as they took part in a School Football Festival. The day began with a guided tour of the Academy building, giving scholars a behind-the-scenes insight into the daily life of a professional footballer. They first explored the dining areas, meeting rooms and the analytical centre, where players review match clips to enhance their performance. This rare glimpse into the professional environment set the tone for an inspiring day ahead. One of the many highlights was the opportunity to try SoccerBot 360, the UK's first £750,000 football simulator (see below). Using advanced camera systems and a fully immersive 360-degree projection screen, SoccerBot 360 challenges players to improve scanning, first touch and passing through a series of fast-paced interactive games. Scholars experienced how the technology can recreate in-game situations, allowing players to revisit moments from previous matches and refine their decision-making skills. Afterwards, the team took to the pitch to compete against schools from Norfolk and Cambridgeshire. Demonstrating outstanding teamwork, determination and skill, the Britten team remained unbeaten throughout the tournament, beating teams from Wymondham College, Hethersett Academy, Etonbury School, Springwood Academy and King's School Peterborough. Their consistency, resilience and flair ultimately saw them crowned tournament champions! A fantastic achievement that capped an exceptional day. School Notices

FROM MRS ARMON, HEAD OF LOWER SCHOOL

Parents & carers must advise the relevant year team of any planned absence (e.g. medical appointments)

at least 24 hours in advance to enable staff to complete the necessary paperwork in a timely manner.

Without this, the School cannot guarantee that scholars will be ready for collection when required.

School Safeguarding

Safeguarding is a priority at Benjamin Britten School and entails keeping the school community safe from harm, abuse, or injury.

This duty of care is taken very seriously. All staff receive annual safeguarding training and ensure that safer recruiting practices are followed. Scholars are reminded of the need for safeguarding and key safeguarding messages are provided through Social Ethics lessons, tutorial time activities, and year assemblies.

The School is committed to safeguarding scholars, staff and visitors.

We expect all staff, volunteers, and visitors to share this commitment and brief them on our procedures and practices when they arrive. Safeguarding incorporates the prevention of extremism and radicalisation as well as child protection, and concentrates on the wellbeing of the young person.

The School aims to ensure any indication that a young person is not thriving or is failing to meet his or her potential is detected as soon as possible.

If you have any concerns and would like to discuss them with the safeguarding team in the strictest of confidence, please contact Mrs Thurbon or Mrs Armon, the school's Designated Safeguarding Leads.

Uniform Policy

<u>Footwear</u> - Formal black shoes, with a leather upper, of a safe and comfortable style and heel height. Those that look like boots/trainers or are made of canvas, or have flashes of colour are not acceptable.

<u>Jewellery</u> - Jewellery is not part of the uniform. Small sleeper type earrings or small discreet studs may be worn, no bigger than a 5 pence piece (one in each ear). No nose studs, facial or body piercings are permitted. *This includes plastic stud retainers*.

<u>Hair</u> - Hair should be of natural colour and style.

<u>Make-up</u> - Make-up is not permitted. This includes fake tan.

Nails - Nail varnish/false nails must not be worn.

Eyelashes - False eyelashes/eyelash extensions are not permitted.

<u>Coats and Hoodies</u> - Coats and hoodies must not be worn in school. Hoodies will be confiscated if seen being worn inside the building.

Benjamin Britten School reserves the right not to accept scholars in lessons who exceed what the School deems reasonable.

Lovell Construction Visit: On 16 October, thirty Year 10 scholars participated in an employer-led careers event hosted by Lovell Construction, the UK's third-largest construction company. Scholars were split into groups and set a challenge of designing a new housing development which was not only ecologically friendly, but also adhered to the strict laws relating to environmental protection, amenities, building density and drainage. As part of this challenge, groups were taken to the site of the future Garden Town at Corton and had a Q&A session with architects and project managers. A week later, Lovell Construction returned to the School to judge the 10 submissions of the new housing development project. After much deliberation, two teams were chosen and each member received a certificate and £25 Amazon gift card from the Regional Director of Lovell Construction. Award winners were: H. Gooch, T. Mathematics News

Maths Symposium 2025: The Norwich School once again played host to the annual Norfolk Maths Symposium on 13 November at The Space in Norwich and 30 high-attaining scholars from Year 10 and 11 had the opportunity of representing the School. The event began with a talk from Dr Nira Chamberlain, Principal Consultant in Data Science and Mathematical Modelling and listed as "one of the UK's top 100 scientists", who delivered an eye-opening talk on the ethics of AI and how advances in the use of AI in business and economics can be both a threat and a cure for our global society. Dr Ben Sparks spoke on the origin of number and gave a live



demonstration of Mandelbrot's fractal design. He also explained how to find out if you have -1 sheep in your field (if you put another sheep in the field you'll still have no sheep...). Finally, Dr Tom Crawford used an ab exerciser and a ball to demonstrate how to track plastic pollution in our seas (hint: it has a lot to do with Coriolis Force), whilst also demonstrating mathematical models from his PhD thesis on the coastline at Gorleston. Mr Locke (Maths) congratulates all scholars for their professionalism.

Find My Future 2025: On 20 November, 14 Year 8 scholars attended the Find My Future event at the John Innes Centre to explore roles within STEAM that are available once they leave school. The day started with a talk from Ruth Perkins (STEAM communicator with 15 years experience) about where maths is applicable in everyday life, from hair dressing to waste management. Then, Rose McNelly (PhD researcher at UEA) spoke of her journey from rural Norfolk, to the University of Cambridge, to a career in researching starch. And finally, Vidura Foneska (aerospace engineer) spoke of his journey from Sri Lankan origins to his career in aerospace and how he became a body popper/break dancer, even



showcasing his skills. Between these talks, scholars had opportunities to speak to professionals in many fields, including farming, mathematics, chemical engineering and computing, to name but a few. They also visited the STEAM careers fair to see what is available in tertiary education, including degrees and apprenticeships. Mr Locke extends his appreciation to all involved.

Creative Writing Workshop:

The School welcomed acclaimed author Ashley Hickson-Lovence to the School Library on 11 November for a day of creativity, inspiration, and hands-on writing experience. The writer, best known for his innovative storytelling and focus on real-life experiences, led a dynamic creative writing workshop for GCSE scholars. During the workshop, Ashley modelled effective writing techniques and encouraged scholars to draw inspiration from their own lives when crafting stories. Using visual prompts, vocabulary cards, and story cubes, scholars experimented with new ideas and wrote short narratives to music. They also explored fresh



approaches to poetry, taking inspiration from The Watcher by Caleb Femi to spark imaginative new pieces. Later that day, Ashley hosted a Q&A for members of the school's Creative Writing Club. He shared candid stories about his own journey as an author—including the rejection letters he received early on from publishers —to emphasise the importance of resilience and perseverance. He also offered practical advice on the path to publication, leaving aspiring writers with a clearer sense of what it takes to succeed. By the end of the day three delighted scholars went home with signed copies of his book 'Wild East', while many more left with something equally valuable: a new passion for creative writing and the belief that their stories are always worth telling. Britten as a Boy Statue: On the afternoon of 10 November, a bronze statue commemorating Benjamin Britten was unveiled in Kitchener's Gardens, near the seafront, in recognition of Lowestoft's most famous son. Designed by the UK's foremost sculptor in bronze, Ian Rank-Broadley, the statue depicts Britten as a schoolboy looking out across the North Sea, the source for many of his compositions. Despite the inclement weather, a large number of people gathered to hear the project leader, Zeb Soanes, reflect on the five year 'Britten as a Boy' fundraising appeal to create the statue, and to thank everyone who had made it a reality. Composer Sir John Rutter, who as a boy in 1963 had sung with Britten, unveiled the statue to rapturous applause. Pupils from St. Mary's RC Primary School gave a spirited, yet rain-blown, rendition of a specially-commissioned song entitled, 'What Bliss is Home' led by the conductor, Ben Parry. The Hartismere Family of Schools Trust, which contributed to the fundraising appeal, was represented by Executive Headmaster, Dr J. McAtear, whilst Benjamin Britten Music Academy, which is a supporting school of the project, was represented by Mr Mullender (careers).









National Languages Competition: In the week of 17 November, a number of Year 9 scholars took part in the online National Languages Competition run by GCHQ. The competition presents young people with a vast number of easy, hard and extreme challenges in many different languages, including fictitious ones.
