	Reason for invading
Harald Hardrada also wants to conquer England. He is from Norway. He has a lot of support in the North and may be successful. If Hardrada defeats Godwinson, they may use their base in England to attack Normandy. If I conquer England now, Normandy will be protected.	
England is a wealthy country. The Saxons would have to pay taxes to me, just like they paid taxes to the Romans...conquering England could make me a very, very rich man.	
I will also become powerful. I might have to do a lot of travelling to ensure that I am not overthrown in my absence. But I am sure I can persuade them that they will gain more from supporting me than challenging me! My sons will inherit an empire and history will remember me as a successful warrior and a mighty King.	
England is the only place to attack if I want to become more powerful. England has no castles or city walls to protect it.	
Harold Godwinson is a liar who has not right to the throne. He rebelled against his King, Edward the Confessor and Edward had to ask me for help! After this rebellion by Harold, Edward decided that I should be King, not Harold.	
The Pope, Alexander II has agreed that Edward's wishes should be supported. The Pope is God's representative on earth and now he has given me his blessing to become the King of England.	

Task 2 – Where should you build your castle?

After William defeated Harold at the Battle of Hastings, his next task was to make the rest of England accept his authority.

He sent Norman lords to control different parts of the country for him. They had to build castles as quickly as possible.

These castles had several purposes:

- They made local people believe that the Normans were powerful and should not be challenged.
- They were the places people came to pay their taxes.
- They were the places where people were taken when they broke the law.
- They looked even more impressive as normal people's houses were small huts with one room made of wattle and daub (straw, sticks, mud, and sometimes animal poo!)

Things to consider when building a castle.

You will have to build your castle quickly because the local people will be angry that you are taking their land.

This means that **you need lots of workers.**

The first castle needs to be made of wood with a high fence for protection.

This means **you will need lots of wood.**

You have to protect England from invasion, attackers might come across the sea.


You need to protect yourself from uprisings of the local people.

You need to be able to travel easily, maybe even to London to visit the King.

You may also need to send messages to the King.

This map shows five different possible places where you could build your castle.
